ACE Rail Trench Project Moves Closer to Construction

With the final design complete and key agreements in place, the long-awaited Alameda Corridor-East San Gabriel "Trench" Project is now close to starting construction. In June, the San Gabriel City Council voted 5-0 to approve the Construction, Operations and Maintenance Agreement (COM) for the Trench project.

The agreement between the City, Corridor Authority, and Union Pacific Railroad was a critical step that allowed ACE to receive California Transportation Commission (CTC) approval to begin construction of the project. The CTC also voted unanimously to approve the project. Other agreements that are now in place include documents governing historic preservation and archaeology. The final Environmental Impact Report was certified in April 2010 and property acquisition is complete.

The first phase of construction, consisting of utility relocation and archaeological excavation, began in August. This phase of work is funded by Measure R transportation sales tax revenue. The second phase—the main construction contract—will begin when state Proposition 1B bond funds are made available. If bond funding is available as expected in early 2012, the main contract work could begin by mid-2012 and be substantially complete by 2015. The total project cost is estimated at nearly \$500 million.

The San Gabriel Trench will lower 1.4 miles of railroad track into a trench with bridges at Ramona Street, Mission Road, Del Mar Avenue and San Gabriel Boulevard, allowing vehicles and pedestrians to pass over the tracks. The project will eliminate delays for emergency responders and the potential for crossing collisions. Other community benefits include preservation of artifacts in the Mission District, additional open spaces and landscaping, aesthetic bridge treatments; and pavement rehabilitation on two miles of streets in the construction area.

Neighbors Unite Against Crime at National Night Out Celebration

More than 3,000 residents recently celebrated San Gabriel's National Night Out, which showcases a citywide commitment for neighbors to join together to make their neighborhoods safer.

On August 2, more than 40 block parties were organized, providing families with an opportunity to get to know their neighbors. Long tables were filled to the brim with hamburgers, hot dogs, salads, homemade pies, and children's games.

This marked the 17th year that San Gabriel has officially participated in National Night Out; the City has also won the National Award for cities of 50,000 or less six times!

"It's nice for neighbors to get out and talk to each other; to know each other by face and name," Crime Prevention Officer Alex Acosta said.

Most of the parties ran from 6:30-9:30 p.m. and were hosted by a block captain or a neighbor on the block, who organized everything from ice cream socials to barbecues. Local law enforcement, fire/rescue, government officials, military units and FM 98.7 radio stopped by the neighborhoods to meet people and answer any questions they had.

"We learned about National Night Out from a friend who is a member of Neighborhood Watch," Block Captains Russ and Peggy Hibbs said. "We ended up joining Neighborhood Watch because we thought this might be a great way to get our neighbors together. We always have a great time, and it has helped us to become a close knit neighborhood!"

"Residents of our community have made a commitment that they are not going to let crime take over their neighborhood. Our community now has one of the most successful Neighborhood Watch programs in the San Gabriel Valley," said Chief David A. Lawton. "When you participate in events like National Night Out, it helps break down barriers, and it's easier to say, 'Hey, I know those people, they're my neighbors.'"

San Gabriel Community Foundation Awards Grants to School District, Family Services

The San Gabriel Community Foundation (SGCF), formed a decade ago through an alliance with the City of San Gabriel, San Gabriel Unified School District, San Gabriel Valley Medical Center and Church of Our Savior, has awarded its 2011 Healthy Community Grants to the San Gabriel Unified School District (SGUSD) and Santa Anita Family Services.

"The grant committee was pleased to see these two local organizations working together in their efforts to meet the mental health care needs of our community," said Governing Board and Grants Committee Member Diane Acosta.

The following programs will receive funding: SGUSD received a \$6,000 grant for their All Aboard! program. This program serves underprivileged students and families who are struggling academically due to behavioral, emotional, or mental health issues.

All Aboard! aims to address and help meet the needs of vulnerable students by improving access to health care services in providing mental health services. Through highly competitive internships sponsored by local universities, the program leverages the services of Marriage and Family Therapy Trainees to provide therapy to students who are struggling academically. The target population is approximately 250 low-income students and families annually, 90-100 students monthly, and approximately 100 direct client contact hours weekly. The total budget for All Aboard! is \$69,560.

Santa Anita Family Services received a \$3,000 grant for their Early Intervention Counseling Program. This program provides counseling services to San Gabriel elementary school children and their families at no cost. Working in conjunction with SGUSD, children are identified with high risk behavioral, familial, and/or academic issues that are deemed more difficult than can be handled during and on school sites (most likely, the students would be referrals from the SGUSD All Aboard! Program).

Issues typically requiring more intensive treatment would include child abuse, children witnessing abuse in the home, domestic violence, drug abuse, single parents, grandparents as parents, financial hardships, marital discord, divorce, co-parenting issues, etc. The target population is approximately 16 families or 64 individuals. The total budget for the Early Intervention Counseling Program is \$16,000.

The SGCF today operates as a local affiliate of the California Community Foundation. Protect Our Watersheds and Oceans

San Gabriel is well on its way to being a 'green' City! One of these green goals is improved water quality, which is important in order to protect the environment, wildlife, and recreational uses of our water, from nearby neighborhood streams all the way to the Pacific.

San Gabriel currently implements a number of water quality measures, including stormwater pollution prevention. The City's efforts are guided, in part, by federal and state regulations including the Clean Water Act and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) program. San Gabriel, for instance, has reduced the pollution and water flowing from the City's storm drain system into the Pacific.

Maintaining a healthy environment is everyone's responsibility. Below are some things you can do to help improve water quality:

- Conserve and re-use water for future landscape watering.
- Go organic or homemade to minimize the use of fertilizers and toxic chemicals.
- Sweep sidewalks instead of hosing.
- Use mulch to control runoff and reduce soil erosion.
- Recycle and properly dispose of hazardous waste.
- Keep bacteria out of storm drains by picking up your pet's droppings and dispose them in the trash.
- Collect rainwater and use it for future landscape watering.
- Never dump grease or oil in drains. Use cat litter to collect spilled oil/grease. Sweep it up, then dispose of it by calling your trash company for a special pick-up or bringing it to a City household hazardous waste collection event.
- Make sure all water runoff from pressure washing flows to landscape. Don't use soap or detergents.
- If you see illegal dumping into the storm drain, call the City at (626) 457-4638. Remember, only rain in the storm drain!

Street Improvements Revitalizing San Gabriel Boulevard

You may have noticed that a major portion of San Gabriel Boulevard is undergoing the municipal equivalent of a facelift. The first phase of the 1.2-mile San Gabriel Boulevard Streetscape Project between El Monte Street and Grand Avenue is now underway.

The streetscape project will help beautify and revitalize the business district. Improving the appearance and condition of this important north-south thoroughfare and making it a destination for motorists and pedestrians is a high priority for the City Council, residents, and businesses. The San Gabriel Redevelopment Agency awarded a \$758,498 construction contract to Marina Landscape Inc. for landscape medians, curbs and ramps, streetlights, site furnishings, and street trees. The project is funded with federal Community Development Block Grant, American Recovery & Reinvestment Act, and redevelopment funds.

The improvements are consistent with the Streetscape Master Plan from Elm and Central avenues designed by Katherine Spitz Associates. The master plan was approved by the San Gabriel Redevelopment Agency and the City Council last March. The Planning and Design Review commissions recommended approval of the draft streetscape master plan after presentation and review by stakeholders.

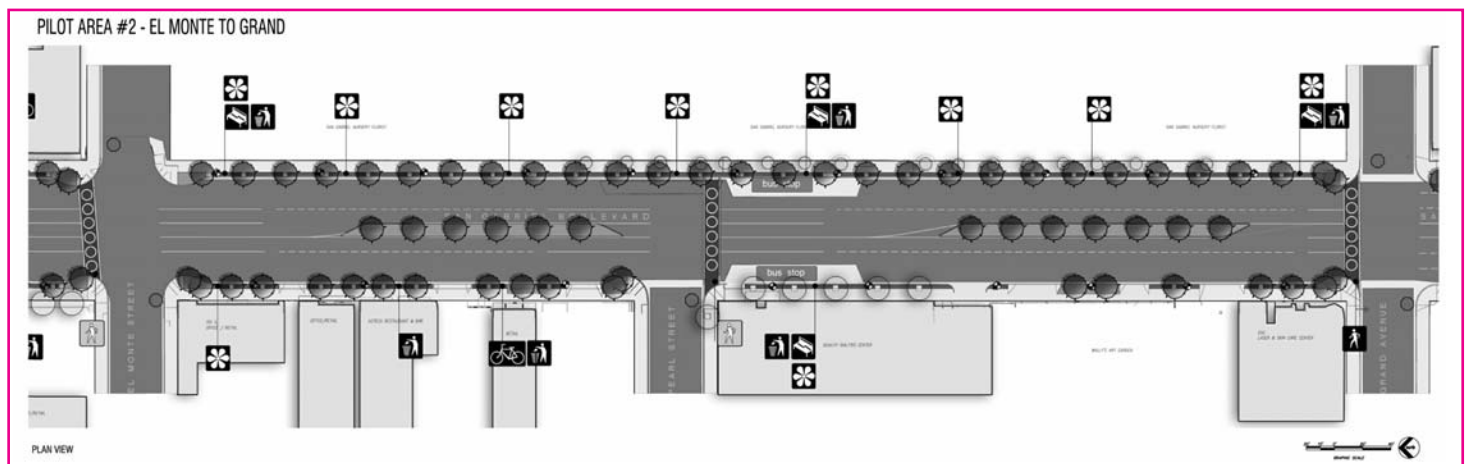
The entire boulevard streetscape improvements are estimated to cost \$5 million, and implementation is occurring in phases as funds become available. Proponents of new development along the boulevard in the redevelopment project area will also contribute. In September, the MTA Board of Directors approved a \$563,000 grant to San Gabriel for another pilot area. The grant will augment the streetscape treatment for the San Gabriel Boulevard Bridge funded with \$419,243 of redevelopment monies to be implemented by the Alameda Corridor East Authority as part of the trench project under the city's Betterment Agreement.

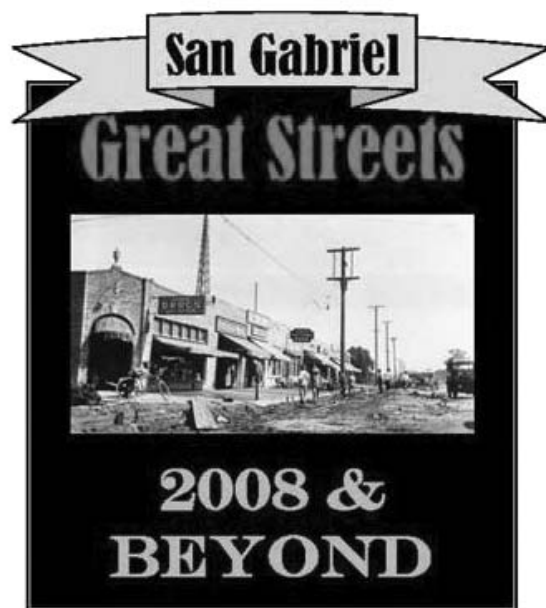
Conceptual 3D rendering of proposed improvements

Great Streets Program Restoring, Preserving Local Streets

Through the Great Streets Program, the City utilizes a variety of techniques to restore and prolong the life of your streets. These pavement treatments include asphalt overlays, crack sealing, patching and seal coat, and they are usually divided into two categories: preventive maintenance and rehabilitation.

The City avoids costly rehabilitation work on streets that are still in satisfactory structural condition by conducting preventive maintenance. In August, the City Council awarded a project to Pavement Coatings, Inc. to perform maintenance on 54 segments of local streets. Check out the list of streets for this project at www.sangabrielcity.com. This work consists of sealing large cracks,

covering the surface with a thin layer of liquid asphalt slurry that will prolong the life of the street at a fraction of the cost of an asphalt overlay, and a few minor asphalt overlays. This project is underway and is expected to be substantially complete by December 2011.

Pavement rehabilitation is necessary for streets that are in poor condition and typically involves patching, grinding down old pavement and installing a thick layer of asphalt concrete. Design of this year's street rehabilitation project has been completed, and the City expects construction to begin this month.

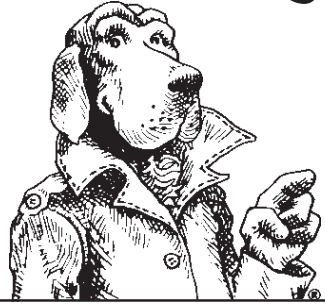

criminals to do their work. The key to increasing personal safety is to learn simple awareness, avoidance, and prevention rather than emphasizing isolation and seclusion.

Here are some personal safety tips:

- If you carry a purse, keep it close to your body and tightly closed. Avoid having a long strap on your purse to prevent it from being grabbed.
- If you carry a wallet, keep it in the front pants pocket if possible.
- Avoid secluded or dark routes, even if they're the shortest.
- Whenever possible, run errands or do your shopping with a friend. There's safety in numbers!
- Have your car or house key in hand as you approach your vehicle or home.
- If you live alone, don't advertise it. Pick up your newspapers, mail, etc., daily. Use only your first initial in phone books, directories, and apartment lobbies.
- Never open your door to strangers, even if they claim to need assistance. Call the police for them, but do not open the door!
- Work out a "buddy" system, and check on each other regularly.
- If you receive checks in the mail, such as a Social Security check, arrange for them to be deposited directly into the bank instead.
- Protect windows and sliding glass doors with good locks or other security devices.
- Never put your purse, wallet or cell phone on a counter while you examine merchandise in a store.
- Make your home appear occupied when you go out by using a timer to turn on lights and a radio.
